At the sanctuary... progress and plans



Much was accomplished in 2011 at the Sanctuary. Although adoptions started out slowly at the beginning of the year, the pace picked up considerably by year's end. Jeff Barker is the resident manager and has a part-time assistant manager to help him run the facility. The highlight of the year was completing the construction of the isolation

unit. This has allowed us to take in more puppies and pets with unknown history. It is also a holding spot for any sick or recovering pets. There are currently two litters of rescue puppies in residence and they are quite a handful. They receive a great deal of attention from our volunteers and visitors and we're hoping for good homes for all of them. We now have a Face Book page and you can also find us on Twitter or, visit You Tube and see videos of the sanctuary. After the heavy freeze last February, there was a lot of landscape cleanup work that had to be done. The van we acquired this year is paying its way with the transportation of our pets.

2012 will see a newly constructed chain link exterior for the cattery play area. We also plan to add porches to the west side of the cattery and the visitors center as it faces the dog park. This will not only provide shade and shelter but will cut down on utility bills in the hot summer months. We plan to add additional dog pens this year and to improve the landscaping surrounding some of the buildings.

Please! Don't bang on my crate...!

Before horrendous cruelty and neglect shattered her she must have been, as we say in the U.K, "a bobby-dazzler." The perfect, show-stopping Cavalier King Charles Spaniel. Now, her long once-ringletted ears were still matted despite her Atlanta rescuers' heroic efforts at grooming them, her beautiful eyes dimmed by neglect, almost blind...and when she opened her mouth to wait her wrongs it was plain this tiny dog had been abused for years...her few remaining teeth rotting and broken. Now, as I collected her crate from El Paso's airport the note on its top would be etched forever in my memory:

PLEASE! DON'T BANG ON MY CRATE. I KNOW MY CRYING ANNOYS YOU BUT I WILL SOON BE OUT OF YOUR WAY...I AM AN ABUSED CAVALIER SPANIEL GOING TO A NEW HOME. THANK YOU!

The pitiful scrap inside, flown in from Atlanta, was seen being tossed from a speeding car on to a freeway and rescued, at some risk, by a woman driving behind who saw the evil deed. She was taken to a Shelter and Cavalier Rescue contacted. The dedicated worker who went to collect her for their rescue place told me later that she cried when she knelt to peer into the little animal's cage...her eyes oozing, claws grown back into flesh, those matted ears, balding tail..and little boobs so pendulous that it was obvious the small creature had never, ever, been allowed to miss a breeding cycle.

As I was on Cav Rescue's file as one who had been very successful with "hopeless" cases, P. called me. "Could you...? She's pretty far gone but...."

I did, hence crate and heart-rending note.

I named her Perdita, after Shakespeare's lost princess in The Winter's Tale, who came home at last and she enriched my life for almost four years though the first weeks were nightmares. If she could not see me she screamed unceasingly.

She clawed the patio door so badly when put out briefly to do her "chores" that I had to re-paint it twice. However, my mantra is "Whatever dog arrives, stays."

Glacially, trust grew until Perdita only whimpered softly in dreams and howled only when put in the car to visit the vet, causing fellow-drivers at lights to glare at me accusingly! She was not blind after all, though needed drops forever. She ballooned to a whopping, for her breed, over 20 lbs of silky fur, as I was all too conscious when she decided to become a lapdog, "chirruping" softly to be lifted! When slippers began vanishing I spied on her and choked with laughter and tears watching her "mumbling" one into her toothless mouth and away to her basket where she curled up with it.

For her remaining years she enriched my life. Now her grayed little face, framed in her hooded sweater, watches from a bookshelf.

Sadly, Perdita's hideous life is not rare and not confined to "muttleys" either. Name any purebred dog and similar ugly tales appear - hauled to shows week after week, beaten and abused for not "winning" or producing "perfect pups", or being deemed too big for their breed. On that last I can cite another rescue, my Japanese Chin I re-named Zorro, as he was so foxy! Shipped from England his buyer reportedly took one look, screamed that he was "Too big for breed" and he was dumped in a kennel to live out his life. Not beaten or starved, just ignored. He, like Perdita, became a beloved pet, literally laughing aloud whenever he was petted, succumbing only finally to incurable bowel disease.

As our Safe Haven would agree, ALL animals deserve rescue and give back in spades whatever we give them.

Foster care ... angels helping our furry friends

Opening up your home to foster care for an animal is a wonderful and rewarding way of helping a pet come closer to being adopted into a forever home. Animals come to Safe Haven from all walks of life. Some may be shy around people, not like men/ women very much, need socializing with humans. Others are sometimes being relinquished on a short timeframe and at a time when Safe Haven does not have space available. Still others may be recovering from a surgery. By placing these pets into temporary foster homes, they are getting a second chance at life. Stays can be from a few weeks to several months.


If you are retired, perhaps like to travel and do not want the full time commitment that a pet takes, fostering may be a way for you to fill that gap in your life that a pet once filled and to contribute to the work we do. You get to specify if you would like to foster a cat, dog, puppy, large dog, small dog – whatever your preference might be, or perhaps you don't



have one. Long time volunteer, Judy Miller, for instance likes to foster dogs some of which have had puppies with them. On the other hand, Elizabeth Parker fosters two senior dogs, one of whom is terminal with cancer. If you are interested in playing this important role in the Safe Haven program, please contact Jeff Barker at (575) 805-5338. Jeff can provide you with more in-depth information and get the Foster Agreement to you. Safe Haven pays for all medical needs the fostered pet may incur.

For whatever reason, they are not deemed adoptable and will most likely spend their days at the sanctuary, living a great life at the cattery and tolerating with disdain their friendlier counterparts.
